STARTLING. OUT OF PLACE. BEAUTIFUL.

While gathered with others to listen in on Debie Thomas' wisdom as our Stern Lecturer earlier this month, I got pulled aside and was asked by a curious attendee, "Why are all the crosses covered?" For reference, she was inquiring about the sheer-ish, purple drapings that were covering each of our crosses within the Church Sanctuary and on Founder's Meadow. The purple being the first of the colors we witness as they are draped on the crosses during Lent and until we say the big "A-----a!" at Easter.

The fabric feels startling. Out of place. Beautiful.

Our focus automatically heightens.

Our bodies remember.

These outward and visible signs of draped coverings invite us into this muddlement of reactions as if to shock our cadences into the reality that something big is about to happen. Shocked into the remembrance that we are soon to be in Jerusalem.

Jolted back to God's presence. A jolting that reminds me of a short, simple line that I read back in seminary and that has been stuck with me ever since:

"Liturgy celebrates the mystery of God."

This very first line of the introduction of A Priest's Handbook (AKA a most handy "how to" guide of sorts for all things related to one-off special liturgies and traditions of our church) invited me to take a deep breath. A deep breath in knowing that none of us have to define God perfectly or exactly, nor have to celebrate God perfectly or exactly. Because, thankfully, our gracious God cannot be contained into one definition or one order of rituals or one prayer.

Over Holy Week, you are invited to St. Matthew's for a wide variety of prayers, rituals, and motions that, while sometimes seemingly unfamiliar and curious, are our way of celebrating all that is God's mysterious grace to be had. And that's part of what makes it glorious.

There's something so powerful in proactively engaging with the unknown as a way to be invited closer to experiencing God's presence in our lives. I truly hope for you to join us to celebrate the precious mysteriousness of God through all that is happening in this coming week, as we pilgrim together amid the complex story of Jesus' last few days as a human with a

yearning for something bigger than ourselves.

And with this invitation comes one small encouragement of a mindset, found in some of Rainer Maria Rilke's writings, that might be helpful from Palm Sunday until we celebrate Christ's Resurrection.

I yearn to belong to something, to be contained in an all-embracing mind that sees me as a single thing.

I yearn to be held in the great hands of your heart oh, let them take me now.

Into them I place these fragments, my life, and you, God-spend them however you want.

No worries of enoughness or adequacy. All that it takes for the Resurrection to be had is showing up. Showing up, fragments and all, with a willingness to celebrate and acknowledge all that is God, even when beyond understanding. Even when startling. Even when out of place. And ain't that oh so beautiful?

Her presentations, taken from her new book, A Faith of Many Rooms: Inhabiting a More Spacious Christianity, invited hearers to think in new ways about being lost, how our stories inform our faith, and what sin and salvation may look like through a twenty-first century lens.

The rainy weather failed to dampen enthusiasm as attendees actively engaged in Q&A after each lecture and enjoyed a hot lunch after the final Saturday session. On Sunday morning, Debie preached a wonderful sermon, then lingered a bit after both services.

This Stern Lecture was made possible through the generosity of the late Dr. W. Eugene Stern, long-time member of the Parish of St. Matthew, who created the Stern Endowment in memory of his beloved wife Libby.


